BIBLE IN A YEAR- The Gospel of Mark

The Four Gospels

- 1. Not biographies; four unique revelations of Jesus Christ.
- 2. Significant parallel to Ezekiel's vision Ezek. 1:4-6, 10.
 - a. Mathew reveals Jesus as the Messiah-King, or the lion.
 - i. To Hebrews, who were **logical**. "Prove it"
 - b. Mark reveals Jesus as the **Suffering Servant**, or the **ox**.
 - i. To Romans, who were **experiential**. "**Do** It"
 - c. Luke reveals Jesus as the **Son of Man**, or the **man**.
 - i. To Greeks, who were **knowledgeable**. "Show It"
 - d. John reveals Jesus as the **Son of God**, or the **eagle**.

The Author

- 1. Mark was his **Roman** surname; John, was his **Hebrew** first name.
- 2. Mark was an **apostle** but held no position among **original twelve**.
- 3. Converted by <u>Peter</u> (1 Pet. 5:13), became close companion for twelve years.
- 4. Traveled with **Paul** and **Barnabas** (Acts 13:13; 15:38; 2 Tim. 4:11)
 - a. This double association placed him in a unique position for writing a gospel to **Gentiles** (Paul's mission) based on the teaching of **Peter**.

Purpose

- 1. Wrote to **Gentile** Christians living in **Rome**. A "**show me**" people.
- 2. Lacks genealogy and teaching material: Credentials of a servant- Action.

- 1. Jesus' ministry to **multitudes** in **Galilee** (1:1-8:21).
 - a. Key revelation: Who Jesus is-Servant of the Lord.
- 2. Jesus' ministry to <u>disciples</u> and journey toward <u>Judea</u> (8:22-16:8).
 - b. Key revelation: What that means- He must suffer.
- 3. Jesus purpose as revealed in Mark is summarized in Mark 10:45.
- 4. The ending of Mark is universally understood to be **added later** (16:9-20).
